Tour 1) "Classic Cracow" -

Experience the Golden Age of the former capital of Poland from its days of glory, when the kings of the Commonwealth of Both Nations ruled an empire from the castle on the Wawel Hill, merchants from all over Europe were trading in the Main Market Square and Copernicus studied in the oldest Polish university. During the tour you will see:

- the medieval fortifications,
- the altar of Veit Stoss in St. Mary's Church,
- Collegium Maius, the oldest university building,
- the Royal Cathedral and the courtyard of the Royal Palace on the Wawel Hill (Entrance to the St. Mary's Church: 6 zł/person).

Tour 2) "Jewish Cracow" -

Experience the unique atmosphere of Kazimierz, a city founded by the greatest Polish king, where Jewish culture flourished for centuries, ReMUh wrote his commentary, Natan Spira talked to prophet Elijah and forbidden parts of Talmud were printed; a place where Catholics and Jews lived side by side for centuries and where today bohemian artists bring new life and flavour. During the tour you will see:

- the Szeroka street, once the center of the medieval Jewish Quarter,
- the ReMUh synagogue and cemetery,
- the Nowy Square, the present bohemian center,
- the Tempel synagogue (Entrance to the synagogues: 5 zł/person).

Tour 3) "John Paul II tour"

Walk in the footsteps of one of the most important people of the 20th century, the man who shaped individual people's spirituality as well as global politics, who under the name Karol Wojtyła came to study in Cracow and left his mark in many places around the city, leaving it only for Rome itself. During the tour you will see:

- the St Florian church,
- the Franciscan church and the "Pope Window", the Royal Cathedral,
- the Na Skałce church.

Tour 4) "WW II Tour"

Learn about the darkest time in Cracow's history, when Nazi Germany occupied the city and destroyed the world that existed here for centuries, wiping out a community that compromised a quarter of the city's population – a time of horrible villains and unexpected heroes. During the tour you will see:

- Places in Kazimierz used for filming 'The Schindler's list',
- The original location of the ghetto,
- The (outer side of) Schindler's factory.
